ⁱ Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. Civil Legal Services clinic enrollment is limited to 5 students, determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. **New 3L students preferred followed by returning 3L students.** If the registration is oversubscribed, additional students will be placed on a waitlist.

ii Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. Defender Aid clinic enrollment is limited to 6 students; 4 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Completion of, or concurrent enrollment in, Criminal Adjudication and/or Criminal Procedure strongly recommended.

iii Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. Family & Child Legal Advocacy clinic enrollment is limited to 6 students; 5 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed, additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Recommended courses: Children & the Law, Domestic Violence and Family Law.

iv Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. Prosecution Assistance clinic enrollment is limited to 6 students; 5 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Completion of, or concurrent enrollment in, Criminal Adjudication and/or Criminal Procedure strongly recommended.

YOffered for S/U credit ONLY. One credit per competition. Credit is given to student competitors in <u>approved</u> inter-school competitions. Please see our Registrar, Dave Bluemel, if you have any questions regarding which are <u>approved</u> competitions. Credit is applied in the semester <u>after</u> the student participates in the regional or national competition.

- viii Research and writing in specialized or advanced areas of the law. Students receive one credit hour for 50 hours of work or 2 credit hours for 100 hours of work. Grades are generally based on a research paper. Students must submit a completed Independent Study form to our Registrar, Dave Bluemel, within one week after the start of the semester. The student must register for the credit and submit to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.
- ix Research and writing in specialized or advanced areas of the law. Students receive one credit hour for 50 hours of work or 2 credit hours for 100 hours of work. Grades are generally based on a research paper. Students must submit a completed Independent Study form to our Registrar, Dave Bluemel, within one week after the start of the semester. The student must register for the credit and submit to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website
- ^x The Clinic Independent Study is meant to allow students to receive credit for continuing work completed in conjunction with a clinic or live practicum. To qualify for Clinic Independent Study credit a student must have completed at least one semester in a clinic or live practicum, and must submit a form to the clinic or practicum instructor and our Registrar, Dave Bluemel. The student must register for the credit and submit to receive credit.
- xi The course has been approved tentatively, and it would be co-taught by Professor Jason Czarnezki, of Pace (Haub) School of Law in New York (a highly ranked school in environmental law), and Professor Sam Kalen, and it will combine students from Wyoming COL and Pace Law School. Each school will be able to take at a minimum 8 students. Housing will be at the AMK ranch in Grand Teton (details still being worked on). This will be the second time the course has been taught. This course will be a one (1) week intensive, three (3) credit field course running from Sunday, June 2, to Sunday, June 9, 2024. There will be short group assignments during the week, and students will be expected to write a short paper after they return from the course, on a related topic of their choosing. It will introduce students to the law of natural resources and public lands, with an emphasis on federal statutes that govern access to and use of natural resources such as wildlife, biodiversity, wilderness and protected lands, water resources, and forests. Students will take field trips to explore and learn about Wyoming's iconic landscapes, and discuss and hear about some of the challenges and issues confronting the management of these landscapes. Professor Kalen will have an information session sometime in early to mid-March (not during spring break!).

xii Summer Trial Institute basics:

1. Registration for this course is on a first come, first served basis and is limited to rising 3L's for the following academic year.

Currently, the course is capped at 24 students, but we do keep a waitlist. We need to have exactly 24 students to make this course work (or a multiple of 4 if the cap is either not met or *potentially* extended). It is very important that you make a firm commitment to this course. If for some reason you cannot take the course but you are registered, you need to drop the course immediately so you are not taking the opportunity away from a fellow student.

2. Mandatory Seat Deposit.

There is a mandatory seat deposit of \$500 for this course that you must submit to Tazmine Haut before April 29th. If she does not receive your physical check by April 29th, you **WILL BE DROPPED** from the course. The check must be made out to the College of Law, and placed in Tazmine's office (you can ask the front desk administrator for assistance) by close of business on April 29th. This deposit is to ensure your enrollment in the course. If you remain in the course, your deposit will be returned to you at the conclusion of the course. The *only* way the check is deposited and you lose the \$500 is if you drop the course after April 29th. *No exceptions!*

3. Course Dates.

This class officially starts July 29^{th} with emailed reading assignments. The classroom portion of the course begins on Sunday, August 4^{th} and runs until end of the day on Friday, August 16^{th} . You must physically be here at the law school the 4^{th} - 16^{th} , so plan your summer schedules accordingly.

No absences

i. This is a full, three-credit semester class crammed into a two-week period. You will be busy from morning to potentially midnight for the full two weeks. On days you are not doing a problem, you will be serving your fellow students in a supporting role. If you miss any part of any day, it is the equivalent to missing weeks of class during the semester.

Optional Saturday Start

4. If you are not able to attend class on Sunday, August 4th, we will hold a special session of class on Saturday, August 3td. [If you are able to attend class on Sunday, August 4th, please do so. If you are here on Sunday, there is no need for you to be here on Saturday. The Saturday class is being offered only for those who are unable to attend on Sunday. If you plan to attend this optional start let Tazmine Haut know upon submission of your seat deposit.]

5. Tuition

Tuition is due at the start of the course (July 29th). To be very clear, if you drop the course during the reading week, it will be considered a withdrawal and appear that way on your transcript and *you will still be charged full tuition for the course*, as well as lose the additional \$500 seat deposit. This is a University policy. With the condensed course dates, there is no drop/add grace period for tuition.
