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Welcome and Important News

Welcome, or welcome back, to the George W. Hopper Law Library. Those of us who are responsible for the law library are happy to have you and want it to become your home away from home. We try to make it a comfortable place in which to work, whether in solitary concentration or as part of a group. Always feel free to let us know how we can improve it. But you, its daily users, create the library's atmosphere in large part. So we rely a great deal on your collegiality and sense of responsibility to achieve the right balance of informality and professionalism.

Resources. We are fortunate that Wyoming has returned to reasonably good economic health. Thus, most of the enhanced funding of recent years has been restored to us, and we have money to acquire new books and databases. Let me, or any other librarian, know if there are materials you would like to have us buy.

Neuroeconomics and Library Use. As I noted above, self-regulation is essential for creating the kind of library we all want. I was happy to see my bias toward few formal rules, and in favor of relying on people's inherent good sense, verified by recent neuroeconomic research. According to the Times of London, "one neuroeconomist thinks our moral code is so ingrained that substituting it with formal regulation can lead to worse behavior."

According to Prof. Paul Zak (Claremont Graduate University) "penalties and regulations 'may crowd out the good behavior that most people, most of the time, follow." In the library context, this means we lay down a few basic rules for its use—our "skeleton of formal regulation," as Prof. Zak puts it—"to stop the sociopaths taking advantage, fleshed out with plenty of self-regulation." Our formal regulations deal with health and safety, the protection of property, and ensuring that everyone enjoys equal access to library resources.

Group Study Rooms. Group study room rules are posted on the door of the rooms. These are great places to take conversations and other group work that would disturb your colleagues who are trying to concentrate in the library. The main thing to keep in mind here is that all your classmates deserve a fair chance to use these rooms, so restrain yourself from trying to game the system by having members of your group sign up serially to keep the room for more than 2 hours. Also, be especially careful to keep clean room 123, which was refurbished in boardroom style by the Class of 2010 and is sometimes used for interviews.

Carrels. You are our primary users, and we welcome your proprietary feeling toward the place. This includes personalizing "your" carrel to make it your comfortable study space. But keep in mind that you'll eventually relinquish the carrel and that you share the library with others whose interests also have to be considered. Make no permanent modifications to your carrel and follow the posted carrel appliance rules. The library is a public place used by lawyers (your potential employers) and the general public, as well as being the workplace for our library staff, so act accordingly.

Swipe Card Access. We had hoped to have swipe card access to the building and the law library in place by the time classes began this semester, but the installation has been delayed by forces outside our control. Until the swipe card access is up and running, we'll continue to use the sign-in procedure by which you can remain in the library after we close to other users. But regardless of the means by which you are here after closing, remember that your security and that of your colleagues after hours is mainly your responsibility. Therefore, do not prop open any outside doors or do anything else that might endanger or inconvenience your classmates.

However, Trend Micro anti-virus software has been discontinued; students are encouraged to download the free Microsoft Security Essentials from the Microsoft website or to use other anti-virus software (free or paid).

Scanner, Printers and Print Quota Increase Utility:

A new scanner has been installed in the lab on the second floor for students' use. In order to use it, you need to log on to the computer next to the scanner.

Grail print server has four printers for law students: One in room 122, one in the small lab (Room 145) and two in the lab (Room 242B).

Once you are in the Law building, your laptop should automatically detect UWyo and UWguest wireless networks. New students using XP may need help from Edward to make UWyo work properly. Users of Vista, Windows 7 and Mac OS x usually figure out all the default settings by themselves.
