Successful completion of the +2 plan requires that a student remain continuously enrolled and graduate with the associate's degree from his or her respective community college. • This is a guide for course work in the major; actual course sequence may vary by student. Please refer to the online student degree evaluation. • Not all courses are offered every semester and some electives may have prerequisites. Students should review the course descriptions in the catalogs of their respective institutions and consult with their academic advisor to plan accordingly.

University of Wyoming requirements:

Students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 to graduate. • Students must complete 42 hours of upper division (3000-level or above) coursework, 30 of which must be from the University of Wyoming. • Courses must be taken for a letter grade unless offered only for S/U.

UW College of Arts and Sciences requirements:

Students must take two "core" courses in addition to UW's University Studies Program requirements: Diversity in the United States (ASD) and Global Awareness (ASG). • No more than 60 hours in the major subject may be used toward the 120 credit hours required for graduation. • At least 30 hours in the major subject must be completed with a grade of C or better (the major may require more).

American Indian Studies Program Notes:

Forty-two (42) hours of coursework in American Indian Studies is required for a bachelor's degree in American Indian Studies. • A grade of C must be earned in all American Indian Studies courses applied to the degree.

History: AIST 3000 (Plains Culture and History - 3 hrs), AIST 4000 (Indians of Wyoming - 3 hrs), and AIST 4466 (American Indian Ethnohistory - 3 hrs).

Environment & Resource Management: AIST 3200 (Indigenous Peoples and Their Environment - 3 hrs) or AIST 4340 (Natural Resource Management on Western Reservations - 3 hrs).

Ways of Knowing: AIST 3400 (Traditional Ecological Knowledge - 3 hrs), AIST 4110 (Educational Foundations in American Indian Education - 3 hrs), AIST 4200 (Indigenous Communities Abroad: International Travel - 4 hrs), or AIST 4740 (Native American Languages and Cultures - 3 hrs).
